#### Local Law No. 1 of 2020 of the Town of Byron, New York Imposing a Moratorium on Solar Energy Systems Pursuant to Town of Byron Local Law 1 of 2016

#### Be It Hereby Enacted By The Town Board Of The Town Of Byron, New York As Follows:

#### Section 1. Title

This Local Law shall be referred to as a "Local Law Imposing a Moratorium on the acceptance of applications of Special Use permits for Solar Energy Systems, ground mounted and issuance of building permits for Solar Energy Systems attached pursuant to Town of Byron Local Law 1 of 2016".

#### Section 2. Purpose, Intent and Enactment of Moratorium

Pursuant to the statutory powers vested in the Town of Byron to regulate and control land use in order to protect the health, safety and welfare of its residents the Town Board of the Town of Byron hereby declares a twelve (12) month moratorium on the acceptance of applications of Special Use permits for Solar Energy Systems, ground mounted and issuance of building permits for Solar Energy Systems, attached pursuant to Town of Byron Local aw 1 of 2016, and hereby amends the Code of the Town of Byron to provide for such moratorium.

Whereas, Local Law 1 of 2016 was adopted by the Town Board of the Town of Byron in order to permit and closely regulate solar energy systems in the Town of Byron; and

Whereas, the Town of Byron is a community with abundant agricultural land desirable to persons or entities seeking to develop solar energy systems; and

Whereas, the Town of Byron adopted a revised comprehensive plan on January 9, 2019 with the stated goals of: preserving the agricultural base – land and farm operations; maintaining the rural character of the Town; and encouraging green energy; and

Whereas, the Town of Byron agricultural economy and the market of renewable energy continue to evolve. It is necessary from time to time to modify Town regulations to better suit current economic conditions and community needs to insure both the Town economy and residents' quality of life are maintained and enhanced; and

Whereas, the zones in which the issuance of such building permits and Special Use Permits for solar energy systems are currently permitted may be too numerous so that the ability of the Town of Byron to protect the health, safety and welfare of its residents is adversely affected; and

Whereas, it is possible that the zones in which the issuance of such building permits and Special Use Permits for solar energy systems are currently allowed may be so numerous that the continued vitality of other commercial an agricultural uses in the Town of Byron may be adversely affected and;

Now, for the foregoing reasons the Town Board of the Town of Byron hereby enacts a 12 month Moratorium on the acceptance of applications for building permits and Special Use Permits for solar energy systems pursuant to Town of Byron Local Law 1 of 2016 and the Code of the Town of Byron is hereby amended to provide for such Moratorium.

#### Section 3. Scope of Controls

During the effective period of this Local Law, the Code Enforcement Officer and/or the Town Planning Board hall not issue any new building or Special Use Permits pursuant to Local Law 1 of 2016.

#### Section 4. Term

The moratorium imposed by this Local Law hall be in effect for a period of twelve (12) months from the effective date of this Local Law.

The Board of the Town of Byron may, by additional Local Law, extend the moratorium period for a period not to exceed six (6) months or, alternatively, terminate said moratorium prior to its expiration.

#### Section 5. Validity

The invalidity of any provision of this Local Law does not affect the validity of any other provision of this Local Law that can be given effect without such invalid provision.

#### Section 6. Effective Date

This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon its adoption by the Town Board of the Town of Byron and the filing thereof with the New York Secretary of State.

#### **Public Comments:**

Candy Hensel – If the Planning Board gets new law done prior to the stipulated one year moratorium can the moratorium be lifted?

Attorney Paul Boylan – It would be up to the Town Board

**Councilwoman Fuller** –Does the moratorium stop the process for people that have already come to the Planning Boards it stop process?

Attorney Paul Boylan - Yes, it's a blanket moratorium

Councilman Kent – The moratorium does not cover the Excelsior project because it is an Article 10 proceeding and the Siting Board can determine whether to follow the local law or not, but smaller projects that may come in would have to follow the local law.

Tom Schelemanow - What are setbacks?

Supervisor Yasses - The setbacks are being discussed at the Planning Board meetings

George Squires – 250- 300 ft. is what they're looking at, but these do not apply to Excelsior project

**Keddy Chandran, Next Era** – They are listening to people's concerns and they intend to follow what the Planning Board decides.

**Maureen Fink** – What is the start date?

**Keddy Chandran, Next Era** – It would enter commercial operation in 2022. Field studies and other studies being done now then the application will be submitted, has not been finalized. There are meetings every Monday at 7:00 pm at the Byron Hotel

Councilman Kent – There is a portion of moratorium that he doesn't agree with. The law doesn't allow for easy descriptions for solar. The moratorium is on all solar, including solar attached to residential buildings, these aren't commercial systems and he feels they should not be included.

**Ken Steinmetz** – Would a variance be allowed?

Councilman Kent - No

Rita Reding - She agrees with Councilman Kent

**Ken Steinmetz** – Can the zoning law just be amended

Attorney Paul Boylan – Yes it can, but he doesn't think the Planning Board is in a position to make a recommendation. If the Town Board does not want the private panels included Paul would need to go back and redo the moratorium and the Town Board would need to hold another special meeting

**Councilman Zuber** – There has been a lot of debate over tier 3, and he doesn't think it will take a year to revise the law.

Supervisor Yasses – Rather than go through this process again, how long does George think before the PB will be done

**George Squires** – He hopes in 2-3 months

**George Squires** – Roof mounted systems are covered under building code and no applications are pending right now. In his personal opinion we don't need a moratorium.

Steve Hohn – Need to deal with the agriculture portion. Nothing in the laws regarding keeping land clean and free of weeds.

# RESOLUTION ADOPTING LOCAL LAW NO. 1 OF 2020 – MORATORIUM ON SOLAR ENERGY SYSTEMS PURSUANT TO TOWN OF BYRON LOCAL LAW 1 OF 2016 RESOLUTION #30:

Councilman Thompson offered the following resolution and moved for its adoption:

**Resolved,** that the Byron Town Board adopts Local Law No. 1 of 2020 entitled Moratorium on Solar Energy Systems Pursuant to Town of Byron Local Law 1 of 2016.

Councilman Zuber seconded the resolution which was adopted by the following vote:

**Councilwoman Fuller** – Is there a conflict if Councilman Zuber, Councilwoman Fuller and Councilman Kent vote?

**Attorney Paul Boylan** – No, it is a zoning issue not a solar issue, on other questions on solar energy process Councilwoman Fuller is conflicted, the County Board of Ethics is considering the other 2 and there is no decision from them, so if they feel they are not conflicted they have to vote on their conscious.

#### Solar:

Jim Lamkin – Representing BAAS (Byron Association Against Solar) – membership exceeds 150 members who are against Excelsior project in the Town of Byron. 945 household were sent fliers, 208 responses against solar. Requests that the Town of Byron goes on record as being against the solar project.

Attorney Paul Boylan – The siting board has in other instances agreed with the Town Board, but they do have the power to override the Town Board in whole in part.

Barb Starowitz - only 200 of 2500 sent back flier

Emily Curran – Which members of the Town Board have a conflict?

Councilman Kent – He has a family member that is in the project

Councilwoman Fuller – Has land leased to solar company

Councilman Zuber – Did not lease land to Excelsior, but is a member of BAAS and has land in the Town of Sweden that he has leased to a solar company and will have solar panels on it soon, has issue with using good farm land to put solar panels on

Councilman Thompson – He has no conflict

**Supervisor Yasses** – He has no skin in the game.

**Tom Schelemanow** – Can Excelsior do an overlay map showing solar panels?

**Keddy Chandran, Next Era -** Visual impact study will be done. Excelsior cares about the Town of Byron's input both positive and negative, for example lowering taxes and revenue to the school, town and county. They are at the meetings on Mondays at the Hotel and try to address as many questions as they can.

Emily Curran – Is there an official committee through the Town of Byron that represents the citizens? Attorney Paul Boylan – the Town Board can form any committee it would like. They would not be eligible for the present intervener funding. More intervener funds will be available at a later date

Steve Hohn – Would it be connected to money that the town is getting since it involves the town Michelle Piaseda, Harris Beach, Attorneys for Next Era – There is intervener funds for PSS (Preliminary Scoping System) and then more intervener funding may be awarded at the application stage when the

application is submitted. **Councilman Kent** – A committee was formed by Candy Hensel at the Byron Hotel and some members of the Town Boards attend and members of Excelsior to answer questions and to brain storm.

**Supervisor Yasses** – He would like Councilman Kent to be the representative of the Town Board to the meetings at the Byron Hotel on Monday nights

George Squires – The Planning Board has 2 alternate positions open. He is not convinced that this is a done deal and there is nothing that the Town can do. Excelsior can back out of the process at any time or the Siting Board can decide not to allow Excelsior to put the solar panels in. He believes there is state money available and the Siting Board is slanted towards the solar companies, but there is no guarantee.

Keddy Chandran - Next Era is actively pursuing all Article 10 processes they are involved in.

**Ben Raccuia** - Leader of the Senate has not made an appointment of an Ad Hoc member to the Siting Board and would encourage people to contact their senator.

**Keddy Chandran** – Next Era is a publicly traded company from Florida and that's where they get their money from. He would urge people to think of the benefits to the Town.

**Barb Starowitz** – The top suicide rate is by farmers because farmers can't survive on farming alone anymore, you have to protect the farmers that are trying to survive. Eric Zuber is opposed to the solar here but has land signed up in Sweden. Would the people rather see them put up a housing tract and then only they would benefit instead of the whole town.

Ben Raccuia – He would also like the Planning Board to look at writing laws for wind energy also.
