MRB Group - Waste Water Treatment Plant SPDES:

•These projects are complete. All data requested by the NYSDEC was submitted to the State on January 22, 2020.

On March 1, 2019 the NYSDEC notified the Town of Byron that effluent disinfection at the three (3) wastewater treatment plants will be required. The first compliance action item is to obtain an approvable Preliminary Engineers Report (PER) detailing disinfection designs. Final engineering design documents are due by 2022 and facilities are to be constructed and operational by May of 2024. The PER is necessary to evaluate all feasible disinfection options for the Town with respect to functionality, reliability, maintenance and cost.

MRB Group obtained a grant for the Town that will provide up to \$30,000 for the PER and requires a 20% local match.

On January 21, 2020 MRB Group provided a proposal to generate the required PER. Additionally, a proposal was provided for grant administration on an hourly basis. The Town Board will need to pass resolutions with regard to these proposals at tonight's meeting.

RE: Conflict of Interest Recommendations

Dear Council Members,

The Genesee County Board of Ethics has been asked to make a recommendation to the Byron Town Board as to whether two sitting council members have interests that compromise their abilities to make decisions solely in the public interest. Article 12 of the General Municipal Law governs conflicts of interest of Municipal Officers and Employees. In addition to these laws there are numerous common law cases where courts have ruled on the issue of conflict of interest as well as multiple Opinions of the Office of the New York State Comptroller that address the issue.

Generally speaking Municipal Officers (and Employees) must avoid situations where there is a personal benefit (i.e. a personal interest) to be gained from rendering a particular decision in their capacity as a Municipal Officer.

Under Section 809 (2) of the General Municipal Law a person is considered to have an interest when: "he, his spouse, or their brothers, sisters, parents, children, grandchildren, or the spouse of any of them (a) is the applicant, or (b) is an officer, director, partner or employee of the applicant, or (c) legally or beneficially owns or controls stock of a

corporate applicant or is a member of a partnership or association applicant, or (d) is a party to an agreement with such an applicant, express or implied, whereby he may receive any payment or other benefit, whether or not for services rendered, dependent or contingent upon the favorable approval of such application, petition or request.

Furthermore, courts have held that a person must be disqualified from voting on a particular matter when their interest is a personal, private interest and not such an interest as he or she has in common with all other citizens or owners of property. Byer v. Town of Poestenkill, 232 A.D. 2d 851 (3d Dept 1997).

Also, a 1979 case Matter of Tuxedo Conservation & Taxpayers Association v. Town of Tuxedo (2d Dept 1979) the court rendered the opinion that "the test to be applied is not whether there is a conflict, but whether there might be... It is the policy of the law to keep the official so far from temptation as to ensure his unselfish devotion to the public interest."

Based on these laws and information we have been provided by the Town Board and its counsel, we make the following recommendations:

With respect to Councilman Eric Zuber, it is this Board's recommendation that he in fact has a conflict of interest such that he should recuse himself from the Town Board's consideration of the Excelsior Energy application.

This recommendation is based on his communications with the Town Board (copy attached) as well as other public comments in the Batavia Daily News (see January 10, 2020 edition) that raises the issue that the matter is a personal, private one affecting his business that sets him apart from the personal financial interest in the outcome of the application such that he should remove himself from any and all discussions and votes that involve the Excelsior Energy application before the Byron Town Board.

With respect to Councilman Joshua Kent it is this Board's recommendation that he recuse himself from the Town Board's consideration of the Excelsior Energy application on the basis that a member of his family has an interest in the Excelsior Energy application.

As it was described in the letter to the Ethics Board, with some misstatements of fact, later clarified by the Town Board's attorney, Mr. Kent's stepmother has an interest in L-Brooke Farms, one of the farms that has an agreement with Excelsior Energy to locate solar panels on its property should the application to the Town be approved.

This circumstance appears to violate General Municipal Law Section 809 (2) as described above, requiring Mr. Kent's recusal despite the fact that Mr. Kent himself would not apparently derive a personal benefit from the approval of the application.

Even if it could be argued that Mr. Kent should not have to recuse himself on this basis he would fail the test based on the Tuxedo case above. The test being not whether there is a conflict but whether there might be. It is therefore strongly recommended that all

elected officials avoid even the appearance of impropriety, including Mr. Kent under these circumstances.

In conclusion The County Ethics Board would like to strongly suggest that the Town of Byron enact their own Code of Ethics as required under Section 806 of General Municipal Law and appoint its own Town Board of Ethics as recommended under Section 808 of General Municipal Law to address any ethical concerns in the future.

Dear Board Members:

The County Board of Ethics has ruled that both Mr. Zuber and Mr. Kent have conflicts of interest; Mr. Zuber because he will by his admission be economically harmed if the Excelsior project is approved, and Mr. Kent because a member of his family, his stepmother, will be economically benefited if the project is approved. Ms. Fuller has been previously disqualified because her signing an option to lease property she owns would economically benefit her if the project is approved.

This circumstance means that three of the five members of the Board have discernable conflicts of interest and under ordinary circumstances would be prohibited from participating in any discussion regarding and voting to take any action regarding to the project. The Board would not be able to establish a quorum and thus would be unable to take any action regarding the project.

Under such circumstances as exist here the Board must invoke what is known as The Rule of Necessity. Simply stated, the Rule says a judge, court, official, or Board may take action with the participation of a conflicted individual or individuals if their disqualification would make it impossible to take any action or render any judgment.

One of the conflicted members of the Board has a conflict that would benefit her and another member has a conflict that would damage him if the project were approved. It is my opinion that both Ms. Fuller and Mr. Zuber may participate in decisions regarding the project. It is my further opinion that Mr. Kent may also participate since to preclude him from participating would be inconsistent given the permitted participation of the other conflicted members. This would also give the Board an odd numbers of members to reduce the possibility of a deadlocked vote.

In summary, it is therefore my opinion that all elected members of the Town Board may fully participate in decisions regarding the solar project by invoking the Rule of Necessity.
