From the Supervisor's Desk

I would like to thank everyone in the Town for allowing me to be your Supervisor. Together, I believe we can make a difference in the future of our Town. If you have any questions, or something you would like me to be aware of, please do not hesitate to call me.

The Town Board is currently working on establishing several water districts. Water District Nos. 3 (Iverson Road) and 4 (Cockram Road West) have recently been bid out, and we are awaiting Comptroller approval in order to proceed with construction. Water District No. 5 (Cockram Road East) is in the beginning phases. The Town has received a Pre-Eligibility Determination (PED) from Rural Development, and the residents are in the process of determining whether they would like to move forward based on the cost of the project. The Town of Byron is working with the Town of Bergen to establish Water District No. 6 (N. Bergen/Merrill/Warboys/Sautell Roads). A survey has gone out to Town of Bergen residents to get their approval in order to proceed. The Town Board has also received petitions for water on Lyman, Freeman and Coward Roads, and another for Swamp and Hessenthaler Road, which are still in the beginning stages.

Amanda's Law

Carbon monoxide alarm requirements went into effect February 22, 2010... It requires essentially all residences, both new and existing, to have carbon monoxide alarms installed. The specific requirements differ for new and existing residences and also on when the buildings were built and subcategories of occupancy groups.

Probably the most asked question has been, what are the requirements for existing one and two family residences. They are required to have one carbon monoxide alarm installed on the lowest story having a sleeping area.

The proposal to modify the Uniform Fire Prevention and Building Code, in order to comply with Amanda's Law, is in the process of being adopted as an emergency rule.

“RR313.4 Carbon monoxide alarms. This section covers the installation, performance and maintenance of carbon monoxide alarms and their components in new and existing buildings. The requirements of this section shall apply to all new and all existing buildings, without regard to the date of construction of the building and without regard to whether such building shall or shall not have been offered for sale.

“Exception: Compliance with this section is not required where no carbon monoxide source is located within or attached to the structure. However, compliance with this section is required if any carbon monoxide source is subsequently located within or attached to the structure.

Building Permits and Inspections

Many residents have called my office recently asking whether or not they need a building permit .If you have any questions about a project you are planning ,please do not hesitate to call or stop in my office at the town hall to pick up a permit application packet.

Changes to properties and structures, including both new construction and renovations or certain remodeling, require zoning and or building permits under the Code of The Town of Byron. The following information offers specific guidelines and examples to help you determine whether permits for planned electrical, plumbing or structural work on your property.

A Building Permit is Required to:

❖ Erect, construct, enlarge, alter, improve, or convert a building or structure. This includes, but not limited to, an attached or detached accessory building such as a garage, carport, breezeway, a storage shed ,a porch or deck or fence.

- ❖ Convert or change the nature of the use or occupancy of a building or part of a building. This includes establishing a home occupation within a dwelling.
- ❖ Install, relocate, or remove interior partitions or walls.
- ❖ Repair fire damage.
- ❖ Demolish any building (including a garage).
- ❖ Install a masonry chimney or metal smokestack.
- ❖ Install any business sign.
- ❖ Construct a deck.
- ❖ Install any in-ground or above-ground pool over 24" in depth
- ❖ Install any hot tub.
- ❖ Install any solid fuel burning unit.

A Building Permit is not Required to:

- ❖ Make ordinary repairs which replace existing materials with new materials of a similar kind. For example: replacing porch steps or railings making a minor roof repair, or a minor repair to a chimney or foundation wall.
- ❖ Install or repair gutters and downspouts.
- ❖ Install siding.
- ❖ Replacing windows when no structural work is required.
- ❖ Install or replace a sidewalk on private property.
- ❖ Re-shingle a roof.

Building Codes are designed to protect property owners, neighbors, and the well-being of the general public. **Please remember that it is up to the permit holder to call for ALL required inspections ,this includes the final inspection .It is also unlawful to occupy or use before a certificate of compliance or occupancy has been issued.** For more information you can call the office at (585) 548-7123 Ext 15

Buffalo Museum of Science - Byron Dig

Dear Citizens of Byron,

For 27 years the Buffalo Museum of Science has supported the Byron Dig, one of North America's most important Ice Age research projects, right in your town. Some of the publications that have resulted from this, along with casts of specimens, are right in the town's historical museum. This project has spread the name of Byron, New York internationally.

Now, as you're probably aware, all cultural institutions are in stress due to the financial climate. The amount that the Buffalo Museum has been able to draw from its endowment is dramatically reduced to the point that, though its commitment to the Dig stands, it cannot provide funding for the 2010 field season. Consequently, I'm essentially going door-to-door in Erie and Genesee counties to raise the funds, minimally \$7500, necessary to do the project in a scientifically responsible way. I know that times are hard for all of us. One always hopes for large donations, but many small donations can also get us there.

Any company or organization that gives \$150 or more will be posted on a prominent sign located just within the Byron hall at the Buffalo Museum of Science. This sign will be visible to people in Hamlin Hall (the "great hall" on the main floor of the museum) as they pass the Byron hall. The sign will go up shortly before the Byron Dig begins in July 2010, and will remain until its successor for the 2011 Byron Dig goes up in the following summer. These donors will also be listed on the Byron Dig page of the Museum's website. I know that Genesee area donors will probably want their names posted closer to home, so a poster will be set up at the Byron Dig during the 3-week field season. From the Historian's Desk

We found some miscellaneous items with dates that may have come from old town minutes;

6/22/1883- New bridge 22X16 ft. across creek just south of the center (historians note at one time Byron was referred to as the Center, or Byron Center) Bridge came from Canton , Ohio (should be bridge over creek just south of the Arrow Mart)

6/13/1884- Terry Street built and opened from Main Street to West Shore RR.

11/19/1886- Large company of finely equipped gypsies encamped on Swamp Rd. 40 – 50 of them, old and young with 15 – 20 horses, 13-15 wagons, some elegant, with dogs, chickens, tents, etc. The men engaged in buying, selling and trading horses. Women peddling and selling fort?

1/20/1888- Byron is a dry town. Not a licensed bar in town to sell intoxicated drinks.

8/10/1888- Mrs. Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Susan B. Anthony visited Byron. (Historians note both were reputed to know and were friends of Ida Caswell who lived at top of the hill on Caswell Rd.)

No date-Odd Fellows Hall was moved to corner of McElver Street and Townline. Later it was torn down and burned by firemen.

No date-Turner Furniture was in the building, later Boyce Hardware. They had an elevator in the back corner to lower caskets from the upstairs. (Historian's note Turner Furniture is the same as Turner Funeral Service in Batavia and Bergen. In the 1800's most funerals were held in the home of the person that had died, so Turner started out making caskets and other furniture for sale. You may own a piece of furniture that was built right alongside someone's casket.)

Byron Fire Department

The Byron Fire Department would like to remind everyone about fire safety and the need for working smoke detectors in your home. There have been a number of fires in both Genesee and Orleans Counties lately. Many fires occur in the winter due to heating and electrical systems being overloaded or not properly maintained. It is very important to make sure that your home's heating and electrical systems are properly installed and maintained and that your smoke alarms and Carbon Monoxide (CO) detectors are working properly. If it has been a while since your furnace was serviced or your chimney was cleaned, now would be a good time to have it done. If you do not have a smoke detector, or you are unsure if the one you have works and you reside in the Town of Byron, just stop by the fire hall on Route 262 any Monday night around 7:00 pm and we will give you one.

Both Fire Departments and the Rescue Squad are always on the lookout for more help, especially daytime crews. It takes many people to run a fire department or rescue squad. Like all organizations we have administrative jobs, as well as firefighting and ambulance service.
