

I understand that the highway garage referendum was voted down, but the expanded committee is back to work to try and come up with an affordable solution to this problem, as it is not going away. The committee discussed possibly eliminating one work bay, and with the rearranging of the current cold storage, we may not have to add cold storage to the new building, which will eliminate some of the cost as well.

Water District 7 has passed the Comptroller's Office, which means it is currently waiting USDA Rural Development funding. The next step would be sending it out to bid. Water District 8 is currently heading to the Comptroller's Office for approval.

On a personal note, I would like the Town's people to know that I will not be running for Town Supervisor in 2017. I truly appreciate the trust and faith that you have put in me, and hope I have done you proud. Hello again, now that we've passed Memorial Day it's road construction season again. If you come upon a work zone, please slow down. If there is a flagger present please follow their instructions. We all would like things to flow as smoothly as possible so please be patient. A possible area you may run into this summer is Chapell Road. We will be finishing off the other half of the road with blacktop. The other roads getting surface treatment at this point are Shelt, Merriman, Cook and Upper Holley Roads. These roads will be getting oil and stone. They will be marked in advance of the project. While the loose stone may be an inconvenience at first, please slow down. Once the road has had time to "set up" a few days we will sweep the excess stone off. As always, we will be continuing with ditches, trees and roadside mowing. Additional blacktop work will be done depending on budget and time constraints. Please remember, if you see our trucks in other towns, this is part of shared services, and without us helping them, we wouldn't be able to get as much of our own work done when they come back to help us. From the Historians' Desk

I thought we would touch on the churches of Byron. Originally, I found there were 5 churches in Byron: The Free Will Baptist Church on Route 237 in North Byron; St. Michaels Roman Catholic Church on Route 237 in South Byron; The German Lutheran Church on Route 262 in Byron next to the cemetery, which is now the Byron Historical Museum; and there was a church north of the four corners on Route 237. These churches are no longer active.

Active churches are: South Byron Methodist Church on Route 237 in South Byron, which was first established on September 26, 1842. It was built at a cost of \$2,500. In 1907 an architect was employed to give an estimate of repairs to the old church. It was decided to tear down the old church and build a new one. The new church was build 1908-1909, it was dedicated on March 24, 1910. Membership was 25, only 3 were men.

Byron Presbyterian Church on Route 262 in Byron. In 1824 my notes say it was consolidated, but not which church it consolidated with, it may have been with the church on Route 237 north of the four corners. In 1830 there were 27 members. In 1818 it was organized as a congregation, and in 1845 it changed to Presbyterian.

~ Guidelines for decorations and plants ~

Decorations may be placed between April 1st and October 1st. Kindly place moveable pots or containers next to the monument, as this makes it easier to mow the grass. Please do not place any glass containers in the cemetery. Live plants (trees, shrubs or flowers) should not be planted in the cemetery without the Byron Cemetery Association's permission. They require maintenance and this has to be taken into consideration before they are planted. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated.

Burial \$600 Cremation burial \$300

Burials on Sundays & holidays are an additional \$100. Additional charges may be added for snow removal and penetration of frost depending on the additional costs to the cemetery.

Genesee County Legislator, Robert Bausch

After reading some of the information released by various state agencies one would think that we are living in alternate universe vs. the reality of living in a rural area of Upstate New York. Reviewing the new state budget each spring always brings that feeling to mind. The tax cap is an excellent example.

As discussed in the last newsletter, Genesee County's tax cap was 0.4% for 2017, no where near the 2% that the governor cites as the cap. Meanwhile, the governor and state legislators have been touting how the state is living under the self imposed 2% cap but only by using a different formula. If the state used the same formula the counties, cities, towns, villages and school districts are required to use, the state budget actually increased 4.6%.

As this is being written, the county is still analyzing the cost of the new state budget to the property owners in Genesee County. New cost ends up at the local level in two ways. First, the state mandates some action and tells the counties to pay. Second, state requires the counties to take an action with the understanding the counties will be reimbursed by the state. Then the state reneges. One good example was the state requirement to increase the district attorney salaries with a promise to reimburse the counties. But they refuse to reimburse the counties leaving the property tax payers holding the bag for approximately \$40,000 in Genesee County.

This year a major new expense and concern is the Office of the Public Defender (OPD). Let me start by saying Jerry Ader, Genesee County Public Defender, is professional, committed and a diligent advocate for his clients. Currently, this office cost Genesee County residents in excess of \$1,000,000 per year. But NYS continues to require more services be performed by that office, with a "promise" to reimburse the county in the future. Some of the new requirements that are not funded are: (A.) Financial eligibility to receive OPD services was raised from 125% of the federal poverty level to 250% of the federal poverty level; (B.) OPD must be present at the first appearance before a judge or magistrate; (C.) Limited the case load for OPD staff attorneys requiring additional hires. Last June both houses of the state legislature overwhelming passed a bipartisan bill to have the state take over all cost of OPD. At 11:45PM on December 31, 2016 (literally) the governor vetoed the bill thereby not allowing the legislature to vote to over ride the veto, which would have been the outcome.

I apologize for being so negative but this is the reality of New York State and the impact of state government's actions on local property taxes.
